On Tuesday 11<sup>th</sup> June, Pupil Free Day, Sheidow Park Steiner faculty hosted the meeting of The Steiner Partnership group. This was inclusive of teachers from Basket Range and Trinity Gardens Steiner Stream. The day began with bread-baking and singing, followed by a discussion and work on designing rubrics for the Steiner Curriculum Classes R-5. All teachers then participated in a study group on Rudolph Steiner's Lecture of 'The Study of Man' with an element of artistic expression in the form of water colour painting and clay work. The day concluded with discussion in year level groups about Moderation for assessment. It was a very fruitful day for all teachers.

The mainstream teachers spent their day learning about "Big ideas in number" facilitated by Melinda Prowse and Aboriginal perspectives facilitated by Jemma Laxton. We also spent time learning about "Developing the Expert Learner". This learning was facilitated by Jo Miller and comes from the South Australian Teaching for Effective Learning framework. This domain

(3.2.) focuses on setting the learning purpose, learning intentions, success criteria and critical feedback. It involves a consistent pedagogy with explicit strategies to move learning forward. This will be a major focus for all staff now and in the future.










